1.0	<u>Introduction</u>	

1.1	This report deals with the elections held on Thursday 5 May 2005. Details of the results and of the candidates elected are given together with other related information. Although not a requirement to report these results to Council (unlike the practice for Borough Council elections) it is considered appropriate to do so in order to maintain a running record of elections held in Eastbourne and for a summary document such as this to be retained permanently in the public domain.
1.2	The county council elections were combined with those for Parliament. The Parliamentary Constituency comprises the whole of the Borough of Eastbourne together with the parishes of Willingdon, Jevington, East Dean and Friston. The area outside the Borough forms one-half of the 2 member county division of Polegate, Willingdon and East Dean.
1.3	The county elections were held in respect of all 9 seats in the Borough. The county division boundaries had recently been redrawn and in place of the former 8 divisions there were now 9 divisions with boundaries and names matching those of the Borough's Wards.
1.4	A total of 38 candidates stood for the County elections representing 5 political parties (Conservative, Green, Labour, Liberal Democrats and the UK Independence Party).
2.0	County Results
2.1	A copy of the election results for the 9 Eastbourne divisions is attached at Appendix 1.
2.2	Across the County of East Sussex as a whole a total of 49 seats were contested. 29 Conservative, 14 Liberal Democrat, 5 Labour and 1 Independent councillors were elected. The previous council composition was 24 Conservative, 14 Liberal Democrat and 6 Labour (a total of 44 seats).
2.3	The share of the vote across the whole town for each of the parties was as follows:

6.4	The total number of replacement posta voting ballot papers issued was 39. The were provided to people who had not received their papers. Proof of identity photograph is generally required in the cases. 6.5	A total of 171 proxy votes were granted. This compared with 123 in 2004, 87 in 2003, 204 in 2002 and 163 in 2000.
7.0	Polling Stations
7.1	37 polling stations were opened between the hours of 7.00 a.m. and 10.00 p.m. on the 5 May at 34 different venues. A total of 123 people were employed for the day to staff the stations.
8.0	Counting Arrangements
8.1	The count took place at the Kings Centre, Edison Road, Hampden Park. The venue was chosen as it could provide 2 large halls and additional space to allow for both counts to be undertaken on the same night. 140 counting staff plus a further 21 were engaged for the purposes of counting the votes and associated tasks. The count commenced at 10.00 p.m. on the 5 May. Other Council staff assisted, including Local Democracy staff, Town Hall reception and support staff, Press Office and Communications staff and the members of the Council's Corporate Management Team. The first stage of the Count was to verify the numbers of both the county and parliamentary ballot papers. Once this task was completed (at about midnight) the 2 counts began in separate halls.
8.2	The Parliamentary result was declared at approx. 3.15am. The County election results were then declared afterwards.
9.0	<u>De-briefing</u>

9.1	As is now the usual practice, party election agents will be invited to a de-brief meeting with the objective of improving upon the arrangements for future years. This has yet to be arranged but I would anticipate that it will take place in late July. It would be helpful if any Members who wish to raise any issues or make suggestions for the future could draw these to my attention or raise them direct with their party agent.
10.0	Conclusion
10.1	In conclusion I would like to thank all the Council's staff and in particular the Local Democracy team for their efforts in the arrangements and successful conduct of the election process. I would also like to make special mention of the efforts of all those involved in the issue and opening of the postal votes. The ever increasing numbers of postal voters means that this part of the election process is assuming a level of importance on a par with the organisation and staffing of the polling stations and of the main count and now requires a comparable investment in the resources devoted to it. I would also wish to thank the Party Agents for their co-operation and understanding.
