1.	Introduction
1.1	On 28 <sup>th</sup> September 2001 the Head of Planning exercised his delegated powers and authorised the making of a tree preservation order in respect of trees on the above land. There are 46 Trees at the site of which they are mainly Acer Pseudoplatanus (Sycamore Trees)  The Head of Planning took this action because some of the trees were under threat of felling and a tree preservation order will ensure long term retention of the trees.
	The Order was made on 18 <sup>th</sup> October 2001.

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The Order will continue in force until the expiration of a period of six months from the making of the Order or the date on which the Order is confirmed, whichever first occurs.
Confirmation Procedure
The Committee must now decide whether to confirm the Order. The Committee may:
· confirm an Order without modification or subject to such modification as it considers it expedient; or
· decline to confirm the Order, in which case it lapses.
Before making a decision the Committee must take into account any objections or representations made within the prescribed period.
Consultations
Copies of the Order and statutory notice have been served on the owners and occupiers of the land and adjoining land.
No objections or representations were received.

The confirmation of the Order will ensure the protection of the trees, which make a significant contribution to the visual amenity of the area.
