**Subject:** Application For Conversion & Variation of A Premises Licence For  
The Eagle Public House, 57 South Street, Eastbourne  
**Report Of:** Karen Plympton, Licensing Manager  
**Ward(s)** Town Centre  
**Purpose** To determine a variation application under the Licensing Act 2003 for an existing licensed premises  
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## **1.0 Introduction & Background**

- 1.1 An application has been received from Ms Sarah Jane Sanders of "The Eagle," 57 South Street, Eastbourne.
- 1.2 The premises have traded as a public house for many years without conditions and have applied to convert their Justices On Licence under the "grandfather rights" system established by the Licensing Act 2003. This allows them to supply alcohol to a premises licence for the sale of alcohol within the previous permitted hours and restrictions as set by the Licensing Act 1964, namely:

- 2.2 In respect of the application for Conversion of the premises licence, no representations have been received from Sussex Police and as such, this part of the application is deemed granted.
- 2.3 The applicant has applied at the same time for a variation of such a premises licence in this transitional period, pursuant to Schedule 8 Para

71(b) of the Licensing Act 2003. The premises application form, found in Appendix A, seeks permission for the following licensable activities:-

- Provision of regulated entertainment, comprising of:
- Screening of films
- Indoor Sporting events
- Live music and voice, both acoustic and amplified.
- Provision of recorded music
- Anything of a similar description
- To provide the facilities for making music
- To provide the facilities for music and dancing
- Sale of alcohol by retail

## **2.2 Hours of licensable activities:**

### **2.3 Sale of alcohol by retail**

- Monday – Sunday 1000 hours – 0030 hours, save:  
Friday preceding Bank Holiday –  
1000 hours – 0100 hours
- Saturday, Sunday & Monday of Bank Holiday –  
1000 – 0100 hours
- Christmas Eve & Boxing Day –  
1000 hours – 0100 hours
- New Years Eve – New Years Day  
1000 hours – 0100 hours
- “Event days” of which the Police have had written notification  
and over which they have a veto –  
1000 hours – 0100 hours

### **2.4 Other licensable activities**

As per application form

### **2.5 Open to the public**

- Monday – Sunday -1000 hours – 0100 hours

## **3.0 Consultation Process**

3.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires applicants to advertise variations both on the premises and in a local newspaper to inform the public of the application. A number of “Responsible Authorities” are also consulted, allowing a consultation period of 28 days for representations to be made. As a result of the consultation process, representations have been received.

#### **4.0 The Decision Making Process** **The Licensing Objectives**

4.1 In their decision making, the Licensing Committee must act to promote the four Licensing objectives. All carry equal weight as part of the process. The licensing objectives are:

- A) The prevention of crime and disorder
- B) Public safety
- C) The prevention of public nuisance
- D) The protection of children from harm

#### **5.0 The Application**

5.1 When submitting an application to vary a licence under the Licensing Act 2003, the applicant is required to describe the additional steps, if any; it intends to take to promote the four Licensing Objectives. The applicants' declaration can be seen on Page 23 of the application form. (Appendix A)

#### **6.0 Eastbourne Borough Councils Statement Of Licensing Policy** **(Appendix B)**

6.1 Whilst each application will be considered on its merits, the Licensing Committee will have due regard for the Eastbourne Borough Council Licensing Statement and the promotion of the 4 Licensing Objectives.

##### **(A) The Prevention Of Crime and Disorder**

Eastbourne Borough Council (EBC) Statement Of Licensing Policy states that the Operating Schedule should include steps to ensure the deterrence and prevention of crime and disorder on and in the vicinity of premises. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

##### **(B) Public Safety**

EBC Statement of Licensing Policy states that the Operating Schedule should include steps to ensure the physical safety of patrons. This might include the imposition of conditions regarding capacity and mechanisms to promote responsible drinking. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

### **(C) Prevention of Public Nuisance**

EBC Statement Of Licensing Policy states that within the Operating Schedule, applicants will be required to demonstrate how they intend to prevent nuisance arising, disturbance occurring and mechanisms to protect amenities. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

### **(D) Protection of children from harm**

EBC Statement Of Licensing Policy requires that operating plans must specify the measures and management controls in place to protect children from harm. Conditions can be placed to restrict access to children from accessing the premises during certain times or when certain licensable activities are taking place. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

## **7.0 Representations (Appendix C)**

A full copy of all representations is included in Appendix C, however a summary appears below:

Interested Parties
<p>Correspondence has been received from Mr and Mrs Wagstaffe of 4 College Road, Eastbourne, who make representations as "interested parties living in the vicinity of the premises." Representations centre around the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and the Prevention of Nuisance.</p> <p>They state that they have "reservations not just about the noise and loud music, but the disturbances in the street." Furthermore, it is stated that the "premises covers sports events and are a venue for live bands, the doors are always open winter and summer and therefore the noise travels. The pub is not designed for live music and is not soundproofed. It is made tolerable because the finishing time is 11pm. Or fear is that if this extension is granted, the whole community will suffer."</p> <p>Additionally, Mr and Mrs Wagstaffe believe that the possible impact of all 5 pubs in the locality is granted later hours, there will be an increase in crime and disorder.</p>
Representations from Responsible Authorities or Other Interested Parties

- 8.0 The Licensing Manager has held discussions with both the applicant, Ms Sanders and those making representations, Mr and Mrs Wagstaffe. The applicant has also attempted to meet with the above, but to no avail.
- 8.1 Discussions with all parties have failed to resolve matters, hence the case being brought to Committee.
- 8.3 Regard will be had to any history or likelihood of nuisance. Powers may be exercised to impose conditions as to hours of opening in order to avoid unreasonable disturbance to residents of the neighbourhood.
- 8.4 In determining what conditions should be attached to licences and certificates as a matter of necessity for the promotion of the licensing objectives. Only necessary, proportionate and reasonable licensing conditions should be imposed on licence on a case by case basis. Appendix D provides the Licensing Committee with a "Pool of Licensing Conditions," which can be attached to licences where it is considered necessary and appropriate.

## **9.0 Options Open To The Panel**

- 9.1. The Panel must have regard for the Local Authority Licensing Statement and statutory guidance in the Licensing Act 2003. Copies of Guidance under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and Eastbourne Borough Councils Licensing Statement have been provided to the Licensing Committee as reference material.
- 9.2 The Panel must take the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the Licensing Objectives:-
- a) Grant the application as requested
  - b) Grant the application but modify it by altering hours or activities, adding conditions, \* or omitting parts as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
  - c) Reject the whole or part of the application

## **\* Appendix D**

### **8.0 Legal Considerations**

- 8.1 The Department For Culture, Media and Sport has issued Guidance under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. This guidance is provided to assist the Authority in carrying out their functions. Furthermore, the Licensing Panel must have due regard for the Eastbourne Licensing Statement.

## **Human Rights**

8.2 The provisions of the Human Rights Act, 1998, must be borne in mind by the Committee when taking licensing decisions under the Licensing Act, 2003. Particular regard should be had to Article 1 of the First Protocol, which relates to the protection of property and the peaceful enjoyment of possessions and property. Article 8 - which relates to the right to respect for private and family life, home and correspondence - should also be borne in mind. While the Human Rights Act makes it unlawful for a local authority to act or to fail to act in a way that is incompatible with a Convention right, Article 1 of the First Protocol and Article 8 are both qualified rights which means that interference - to a justifiable extent - may be permitted as long as what is done:

- has a basis in law;
- is intended to pursue a legitimate purpose
- is necessary and proportionate; and
- is not discriminatory.
