1.0 <u>Introduction & Background</u>

1.1 An application has been received from Punch Taverns PLC, Jubilee House, Burton Upon Trent, Staffordshire in respect of the Tally Ho Public House, Old Town, Eastbourne.

1.2 The premises have traded as a public house for many years without conditions and have applied to convert their Justices On Licence under the "grandfather rights" system established by the Licensing Act 2003. This allows them to supply alcohol to a premises licence for the sale of alcohol within the previous permitted hours and restrictions as set by the Licensing Act 1964, namely:

1000 hours – 2300 hours Monday – Saturday

1200 hours – 2230 hours Sunday

1000 hours – 1500 hours Christmas Day

1900 hours - 2230 hours

1200 hours -2230 hours Good Friday

- 1.3 In respect of the application for Conversion of the premises licence, no representations have been received from Sussex Police an as such, this part of the application is deemed granted.
- 1.4 The applicant has applied at the same time for a variation of such a premises licence in this transitional period, pursuant to Schedule 8 Para 71(b) of the Licensing Act 2003. The premises application form, found in Appendix A, seeks permission for the following licensable activities:-

- Provision of regulated entertainment, comprising of:
- Live music
- Provision of recorded music
- Sale of alcohol by retail

2.0 Hours of licensable activities:

2.1 Sale of alcohol by retail

- Monday – Saturday 1000 hours – 0000 hours - Sunday 1200 hours – 2330 hours

Save For

An additional hour into the morning following every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday for each May Bank Holiday, Spring/Whitsun Bank Holiday and every August Bank Holiday

An additional hour into the morning following every Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday for the Easter Bank Holiday weekend

An additional hour every Christmas Eve & Boxing Day

To reflect existing New Years Eve/New Years Day hours

One hour before, until one hour after, live televised international football and rugby involving a UK national Team

2.2 Other licensable activities

As above save, excluding request in the event of international football and rugby events involving a UK national team.

2.3 Open to the public

3.0 Consultation Process

3.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires applicants to advertise variations both on the premises and in a local newspaper to inform the public of the application. A number of "Responsible Authorities" are also consulted, allowing a consultation period of 28 days for representations to be made. As a result of the consultation process, representations have been received.

4.0 <u>The Decision Making Process</u> The Licensing Objectives

4.1 In their decision making, the Licensing Committee must act to promote the four Licensing objectives. All carry equal weight as part of the process. The licensing objectives are:

- A) The prevention of crime and disorder
- B) Public safety
- C) The prevention of public nuisance
- D) The protection of children from harm

5.0 The Application

5.1 When submitting an application to vary a licence under the Licensing Act 2003, the applicant is required to describe the additional steps, if any; it intends to take to promote the four Licensing Objectives. The applicants' declaration can be seen on Page 23 of the application form. (Appendix A)

6.0 <u>Eastbourne Borough Councils Statement Of Licensing Policy</u>

6.1 Whilst each application will be considered on its merits, the Licensing Committee will have due regard for the Eastbourne Borough Council Licensing Statement and the promotion of the 4 Licensing Objectives.

(A) The Prevention Of Crime and Disorder

Eastbourne Borough Council (EBC) Statement Of Licensing Policy states that the Operating Schedule should include steps to ensure the deterrence and prevention of crime and disorder on and in the vicinity of premises. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

(B) Public Safety

EBC Statement of Licensing Policy states that the Operating Schedule should include steps to ensure the physical safety pf patrons. This might include the imposition of conditions regarding capacity and mechanisms to promote responsible drinking. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

(C) Prevention of Public Nuisance

EBC Statement Of Licensing Policy states that within the Operating Schedule, applicants will be required to demonstrate how they intend to prevent nuisance arising, disturbance occurring and mechanisms to protect amenities. The restriction of types of licensable activity, hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

(D) Protection of children from harm

EBC Statement Of Licensing Policy requires that operating plans must specify the measures and management controls in place to protect children from harm. Conditions can be placed to restrict access to children from accessing the premises during certain times or when certain licensable activities are taking place. The restriction of types of licensable activity,

hours and imposition of conditions may be considered and applied as appropriate.

7.0 Representations (Appendix C)

A full copy of all representations is included in Appendix C, however a summary appears below:

Interested Parties

- ➤ Mr James Rann, 3 Letheren Place, Eastbourne. The "issues of noise and nuisance emanating from the interior of the premises and the noise associated with customers from the pub leaving the premises form the basis of representations." He also states "that glasses and other objects have been thrown into their garden from the pub."
- ➤ Ms Catherine Walsh, 71 Bradford Street, Eastbourne. Ms Walsh hilights the issue of noise and nuisance as being the basis for representations, in particular "loud music, screaming form the toilets at the rear, banging etc." Ms Walsh acknowledges that the situation has improved since Environmental Health (Noise) has become involved.
- ▶ Ms Frances Welch, 3 Letheren Place, Eastbourne identifies the prevention of public nuisance and noise as the reasons for representations. She states that "the live/recorded music and amplification systems cause noise to emanate from the premises, in particular the function room area. Doors are also left open due to the apparent lack of ventilation, exacerbating the problem further. Patrons are also permitted to spill out onto the street and drink outside, causing more noise and a public nuisance. Children run in and out of the premises with no supervision and the noise is worse at closing time as patrons call taxis and so on." Ms Welch also states that "it is impossible to sit outside in her garden or have windows open since this is made impossible by the noise coming from the Tally Ho." Ms Welch acknowledges the steps taken by the Environmental Health Team and suggests that proper ventilation and soundproofing may resolve matters.

Representations from Responsible Authorities

➤ Environmental Health – Noise Complaints have been received from neighbours regarding noise from the premises. "Noise breakout can be attributed to the main and lobby doors being kept "wedged" open." This could be addressed by a condition requiring that the doors remain shut, save for access and egress.

- 7.1 Discussions with all parties, including the applicants Solicitors have failed to resolve matters, hence the case being brought to Committee.
- 7.2 Regard will be had to any history or likelihood of nuisance. Powers may be exercised to impose conditions as to hours of opening in order to avoid unreasonable disturbance to residents of the neighbourhood.
- 7.3 In determining what conditions should be attached to licences and certificates as a matter of necessity for the promotion of the licensing objectives. Only necessary, proportionate and reasonable licensing conditions should be imposed on licence on a case by case basis. The Licensing Committee has been provided with a "Pool of Licensing Conditions," which can be attached to licences where it is considered necessary and appropriate.

8.0 Options Open To The Panel

- 8.1. The Panel must have regard for the Local Authority Licensing Statement and statutory guidance in the Licensing Act 2003. Copies of Guidance under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and Eastbourne Borough Councils Licensing Statement have been provided to the Licensing Committee as reference material.
- 8.2 The Panel must take the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the Licensing Objectives:
 - a) Grant the application as requested
 - b) Grant the application but modify it by altering hours or activities, adding conditions, * or omitting parts as necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
 - c) Reject the whole or part of the application

9.0 Legal Considerations

9.1 The Department For Culture, Media and Sport has issued Guidance under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. This guidance is provided to assist the Authority in carrying out their functions. Furthermore, the Licensing Panel must have due regard for the Eastbourne Licensing Statement.

Human Rights

9.2 The provisions of the Human Rights Act, 1998, must be borne in mind by the Committee when taking licensing decisions under the Licensing Act, 2003. Particular regard should be had to Article 1 of the First Protocol, which relates to the protection of property and the peaceful enjoyment of possessions and property. Article 8 - which relates to the right to respect for private and family life, home and correspondence - should also be borne in mind. While the Human Rights Act makes it unlawful for a local authority to act or to fail to act in a way that is incompatible with a Convention right, Article 1 of the First Protocol and Article 8 are both qualified rights which means that interference - to a justifiable extent - may be permitted as long as what is done:

Has a basis in law; Is intended to pursue a legitimate purpose Is necessary and proportionate; and Is not discriminatory.
