 - (i) Unsung Heros Event Saturday, 27 April 2013

The Chair of the Council reported that he had written to all Members of the Council outlining details of the 'Unsung Heros' event which he was hosting at Newhaven Fort on Saturday, 27 April 2013. He encouraged Councillors Page 1 of 19

to nominate people from their wards who they felt were the 'unsung heros' of their area. Details of nominations needed to be sent to Reema Parmar, Graduate Intern, at Lewes House, Lewes.

(ii) <u>Venue for Future Meetings of the Council Commencing on Thursday,</u> 18 July 2013

Future meetings of the Council, commencing on Thursday, 18 July 2013, would be held in the Council Chamber, County Hall, Lewes. They would be webcast and, subsequently, would be available to view via the Council's website.

(iii) <u>Forthcoming Meeting of the Trustees of the Mountfield Pleasure Ground</u> Trust, Lewes

A meeting of the Council, in its capacity as the sole trustee of the Mountfield Pleasure Ground Trust, Lewes, would be held in Pelham House, Lewes, on a date to be arranged, but likely to be sometime in March 2013. The purpose of the meeting was to consider matters relating to the proposed forthcoming event at the Convent Field, Lewes, featuring the band Mumford and Sons as part of their 'Gentlemen of the Road Tour'.

(iv) Chair of the Council's Engagements

The Council received the list of the Chair of the Council's engagements carried out since the Meeting of the Council held on 5 December 2012.

(v) Urgent Item

The Chair had agreed, in accordance with Section 100B(4)(b) of the Local Government Act 1972, that Report No 39/13 of the Director of Finance entitled "Setting the Council Tax", which had been circulated to all members of the Council on 21 February 2013, be considered as a matter of urgency under Agenda Item 11(ii), in order that the Council could take its decisions based on the most recent information which was available.

147 Petitions

(a) The Chair of the Council received a petition jointly from Mr Colin Reynolds, Chairman, St Mary's Social Centre, Lewes, and Councillor Chartier. The petition contained 4075 signatures and called for the Council to save St Mary's Social Centre and Supporters Club from being sold for redevelopment.

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Mr Reynolds and Councillor Chartier addressed the Council on the subject matter of the petition and the number of signatures.

The petition contained 1,500 or more signatures and, therefore, in accordance with the Council's Petitions Scheme, as set out in Part 6 of its Constitution, it would be debated by the Council at its next meeting on 8 May 2013 as an individual Agenda Item.

(b) The Chair of the Council received a petition on behalf of the business community of Lewes which contained in excess of 1,400 signatures. It called for the Council to not raise the level of car parking charges in Lewes which, if implemented, the petition claimed would be to the detriment of local businesses, would keep visitors away and would increase the cost of living for local residents.

Those presenting the petition addressed the Council on the subject matter of the petition and the number of signatures.

In accordance with Council Procedure Rule 12(a), the petition would be referred to a future meeting of Cabinet.

148 Questions to the Leader of the Council

Councillors asked questions of the Leader of the Council, Councillor Page, on the following subjects, oral responses to which were given at the meeting:

Councillor Edmunds

Question:

The Council had engaged FutureGov to undertake a scoping exercise in respect of Council Tax Benefits. However, Councillor Edmunds had sent the Leader of the Council details of an alternative organisation which was prepared to undertake the necessary work for a lower cost.

Therefore, why was the work awarded in respect of the more expensive contract?

Response:

The details that had been sent by Councillor Edmunds focused mainly on work in respect of the Council Tax Support Scheme whereas the work to be undertaken by FutureGov was much wider and looked at more radical approaches to help all members of the community, not just

those who were in receipt of benefits. It also looked beyond what the benefits system provided to the wider resources in the community and how they could be used in order to help people meet their aspirations.

Therefore, the proposals of the two organisations were not comparable as they related to different things.

Councillor Stockdale

Question:

In accordance with The Local Government Act 1972, second tier Council services were undertaken by local authorities such as the Council. However, with local government finances being squeezed, the Council was seeking to offload some of its loss-making assets onto parish councils.

Did the Council have a strategy which was fair and responsible that identified a group of such assets?

Response:

The Council did have such a strategy and was currently discussing with some town and parish councils the process relating to devolving some of its assets to them.

Question:

With regard to the so-called 'bedroom tax' in which tenants of the Council, housing associations and charities, who were in receipt of benefits, would, from 1 April 2013, receive reduced levels of such benefits if they had more than a defined number of bedrooms in their homes which were deemed to be in excess of their requirements:

- (1) What assessment had the Council made of the likely impact on benefit claimants?;
- (2) How many bedrooms were likely to be freed up by the above measure?; and
- (3) Did the Council have a policy regarding Discretionary Housing Allowance?

Response:

In addition to the current level of available grant funding, the Council had a further sum that could be used to assist the 253 people who would be affected by the new measures.

The Council's existing Allocations Policy was currently being reviewed in order to bring it into line with the welfare reform requirements but the effects of that would be examined and the Council would consider its options.

Councillor Eiloart

Question:

In a recent article which appeared in the Sussex Express newspaper, the Leader of the Council had indicated that the Trustees of the St Mary's Social Centre and Supporters Club, Lewes, had not identified the length of lease that they had on that premises. However, Councillor Eiloart reported that, similarly, the Leader of the Council had not mentioned the use of 'break clauses' in respect of that lease.

Did that mean that the Council had a commitment to not use such 'break clauses'?

Response:

The use of 'break clauses' had not been a secret. The Council was undertaking a review of 48 sites within its property asset portfolio the existing use value of which amounted to around £9.2 million. The estimated development value of those sites was around £150 million. There was the potential to deliver between 500 and 700 residential units across the District, between 300 and 400 of which were affordable, and over 10,000 square metres of commercial development. There was also the opportunity to deliver enhanced community facilities and open space.

The Cabinet Member for Finance and Cost Control, Councillor Smith, then delivered the Budget Speech as follows:
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"Chairman,

We froze the council tax last year and we will do it again next year.

We plan to do it the year after and the year after that.

We were elected to control the level of council tax and that is what we will do.

We will do this by working together for the benefit of the whole district.

We will deliver our promise in the face of unprecedented financial constraints.

The budget we are proposing supports hard pressed taxpayers in our District.

It keeps more of their money in their pockets.

At the same time this Budget reaffirms our commitment to deliver the Council's share of the national deficit reduction target

.... and to improve services and opportunity within the district at the same time.

Let me remind you of our medium term budget forecasts

We have a savings target of £2.9m through to March 2015.

I can report that we have already achieved £1.9m and are on track to deliver the remainder.

The Chancellors autumn statement raised the stakes by £1.3m for the following three years to March 2018.

That's £4.2m by March 2018.

This reality reflects the position of the nations books and the need to rebalance them.

All councils face this scale of challenge.

We will rise to this challenge and deliver our contribution.

Whatever happens we must stick to our course.

But making this decision does not mean stagnation.

On the contrary we have been active to promote opportunity and change.

We have grasped the spirit of new freedoms passed down to Councils.

We are engaging with local communities to help them shape their futures.

Let me give you some examples of what we have achieved:

Newhaven is a good example of our innovation that will reap benefits over time.

We have given our backing and financial support for a University Technical College.

We have attracted business and leisure investors.

We have signed an eco tech city deal partnership with neighbouring councils that has been welcomed by the Government.

All demonstrate that more can be achieved with less.

Residents will benefit from our actions in terms of employment opportunity and frozen council tax

The Council stands to benefit from retained business rates income,,, which will be factored into the medium term budget outlook.

Now let's look at our three PROMISES:

They are to:

- 1 Achieve an unswerving Commitment to customer service.
- <u>2</u> Connect with our workforce and partners to inspire exceptional contribution
- <u>3</u> Save money and, where possible, put money back into our residents and business pockets.

We secured a Government grant of £2.1m to enhance our weekly refuse collections with a food waste collection service. - This will be rolled out over the summer period.

Studies of food waste collection services show that households can save money in their household budgets.

We augmented our housing stock by purchasing the Crest. This will improve our housing service.

We have played a key role in developing the new Council Tax Reduction scheme, with all partners across East Sussex.

We have provided a tailored training programme through our Nexus Academy to enable staff to fulfil their management potential.

We have invested in delivering Agile Working and a long overdue upgrade of the Councils IT infrastructure.

These investments will help connect the workforce and help deliver enhanced customer service.

This means we are delivering on ALL of the promises we have made.

......and now turning back to the finances.

The external auditors commented that we have managed the Council's finances well,,,,, and we provide value for money.

When the recurring budget is rebalanced in 2017/2018,,, the uncommitted Working Balance will be more than adequate at £648,000.

We have not committed any of the New Homes Bonus funding to cover the Council's recurring budget.

New Homes Bonus will have a recurring spending power value of approximately £1.3m by 2016.

Unused spending power will be retained in the Change Management and Spending Power reserve.

We will establish a new Strategic Priority Fund, to support existing and developing projects that have the potential to develop permanent ongoing income or expenditure reductions for the Council. The details are in your papers.

Programme Nexus will continue to support prioritisation of resources and build our reputation as a centre of excellence.

Moving on to next years council tax....

We have consulted with business representatives about our budget and council tax proposals for next year,, and not unsurprisingly,,,they are supportive of a tax freeze.

The financial climate remains tough and a council tax freeze makes a real difference to families and those on fixed or low incomes.

We will therefore help council taxpayers by freezing next year's council tax, deliver the remaining savings target of £350,000 for the coming year.. and will be using £483,841 from the Working Balance.

We can achieve this whilst doing more for local business, more for local communities and more for the environment.

I commend the Council Tax freeze and Cabinet's financial recommendations to you".
